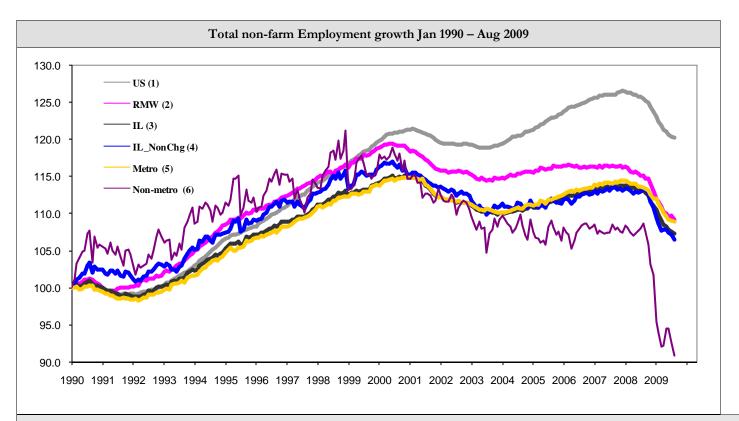

NOTE: The US Bureau of Labor Statistics and the Illinois Department of Employment Security changed the way national and state employment data are coordinated to be more consistent. As a result, there have been some significant changes in estimates for Illinois over the past year. As a companion to the September 2009 Illinois Job Index that reports a **negative** rating, this MSA Report provides a localized picture on Illinois job growth and allows for comparisons between local economies, Illinois, the Nation and the Rest of the Midwest.

The monthly Illinois Job Index and MSA Report are provided as tools for elected officials, policy leaders and the public. We can better understand the Illinois economy and business climate by comparing and measuring Illinois employment growth rates against those of the Rest of the Midwest (RMW: Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Missouri, Ohio and Wisconsin) and the Nation. Data and analysis is provided by the Illinois Economic Observatory / Regional Economics Applications Laboratory, University of Illinois. The MSA data (unless noted) were seasonally adjusted to be consistent with state totals.

	Talking Points
State, Downstate & Metro	 Illinois lost 19,200 jobs at a rate of -0.34% in August, compared to a revised loss of 15,200 jobs in July. Illinois has lost 306,100 jobs since the financial crisis developed in September, 2008 The major geographic divisions, Chicago-Downstate or Metro-Non-metro all lost jobs in August. However, three out of the ten Metro areas added jobs this month. Illinois Non-metro shed 8,500 jobs at -1.94% this month, compared to a revised 9,200 job loss in July. At the same time, Metro posted a loss of -0.20%, losing 10,700 jobs, compared to a revised 6,000 job loss in the previous month. Chicago lost 9,600 jobs at -0.24% in August. Downstate lost 9,600 jobs at -0.59 %, compared to a revised 4,900 job loss in July. Over the last 12-months, Illinois recorded a payroll cut of 306,100 jobs at -5.14%. This is the worst 12-month growth rate since the index started in Jan 1990. In terms of the 12-month aggregated account, Metro registered a negative -4.08% growth by shedding 221,700 jobs whereas Non-Metro lost 84,400 jobs at -16.35%. Chicago lost 205,000 jobs at -4.83% whereas Downstate lost 101,100 jobs at -5.92%.
MSA page (2-4)	 Illinois Metro posted a negative growth rate of -0.20% by shedding 10,700 jobs in July. Out of the ten MSAs, Rockford, Metro-East, and Kankakee recorded positive growth. In terms of growth performance, six MSAs posted a net improvement from July to August, three declined and one MSA kept the same rank. Metro-East ranked as the first in terms of 12-month growth performance, while Chicago ranked as the last. Over the last 12-month period, Metro-East grew the fastest at 2.28% by adding 5,400 jobs. Of the nine MSAs that posted negative growth rates, Chicago had the biggest loss of 205,000 jobs at -4.83%.



Talking Points

State, Downstate & Metro

- While the average growth for Illinois' 1990 to 2008 was 0.04%, the average from Jan 2008 to August 2009 is 0.29%, which is worse than the performance during the 2000-2001 downturn.
- Over the last 12-month period, the average growth rate for Metro was -0.35% and for Non-metro it was -1.45%.
- In contrast to the aggregate trend since January 1990, Illinois performed better than the RMW in terms of yearly aggregated trend both in 2008 and 2009.
- Downstate registered a -0.49% average growth rate in 2009 compared to an average gain of 0.04% in 2006 and 0.10% growth in 2007.

Talking Points

- The most remarkable upward moves in August were by Kankakee (7th to 3rd) and Davenport-Rock Island-Moline (8th to 4th), which both moved up by 4 spots.
- Chicago (9th to 6th), Rockford (3rd to 1st), Peoria (6th to 5th), and Decatur (10th to 9th) also gained in terms of rank from last month.
- Champaign-Urbana-Rantoul (1st to 10th) experienced deepest fall this month.
- Bloomington-Normal (4th to 8th), and Springfield (5th to 6th) both experienced falls in August.
- In the 12 months growth league table, the only upward move was recorded for Rockford (7th to 5th), while the downward moves were by Springfield (5th to 6th) and Peoria (6th to 7th).
- Other seven MSAs maintained the same ranks.
- Metro-East is still on top, while Chicago is still in last place.

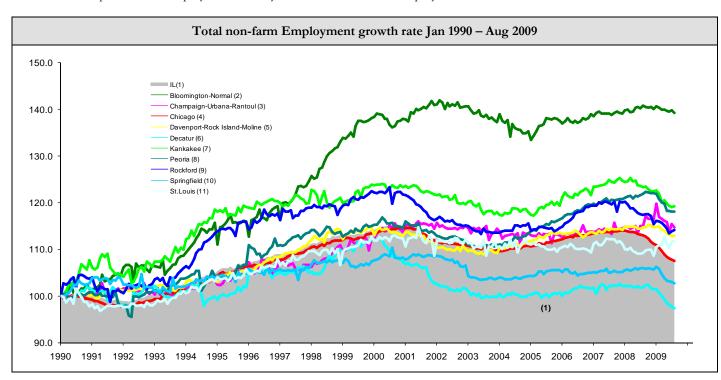
