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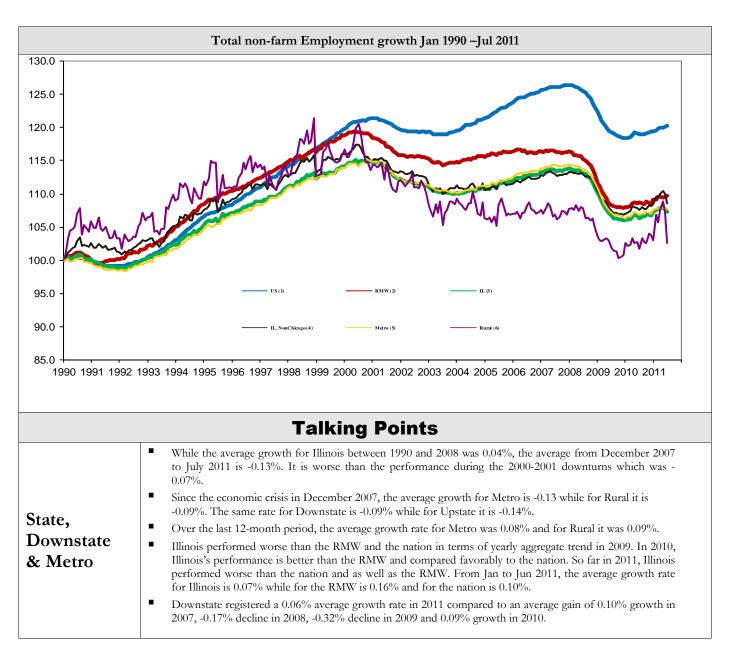

The monthly Illinois Job Index and MSA Report are provided as tools for elected officials, policy leaders and the public. We can better understand the Illinois economy and business climate by comparing and measuring Illinois employment growth rates against those of the Rest of the Midwest (RMW: Indiana, Iowa, Michigan, Missouri, Ohio and Wisconsin) and the Nation. Data and analysis is provided by the Illinois Economic Observatory / Regional Economics Applications Laboratory, University of Illinois. The MSA data (unless noted) were seasonally adjusted to be consistent with state totals.

	Talking Points
State, Downstate & Metro	 Illinois shed 24,900 jobs in Jul 2011 at a rate of -0.44%, compared with a revised 7,300 job losses in Jun 2011. Compared to Jul 2010, Illinois has added 51,000 jobs. The three-month moving average of jobs, a more stable measure of labor market, was down by 9,100 jobs per month. Illinois has lost 332,500 jobs since the economic crisis developed in December 2007. Since January 2010 when Illinois employment resumed after the national recession, Illinois has added 72,200 new jobs. The major geographic divisions, Chicago-Downstate and Metro-Rural all had negative performance. Illinois Rural area shed 21,900 jobs at -4.29% this month, compared to a revised 7,600 job losses in Jun. At the same time, Metro shed 3,000 jobs at -0.06% this month, compared to a revised 300 job gains in the previous month. Chicago shed 3,200 jobs at -0.08% in Jul 2011, compared to a revised 2,100 job losses last month. On the other hand, Downstate shed 21,700 jobs at -1.31%, compared to a revised 5,200 job losses in Jun. In terms of the 12-month aggregated account, Metro registered a positive 0.92% growth by adding 47,100 jobs whereas Rural added 4,000 jobs at 0.83%. Chicago added 36,500 jobs at 0.92% whereas Downstate added 14,600 jobs at 0.90%. Through Jul 2011, the cumulative job growth for Metro, Rural, Chicago and Downstate compared to January 1990 stood at 7.80%, 2.62 %, 6.82% and 8.60%, respectively.
MSA page (2-4)	 Illinois Metro shed 3,000 jobs at -0.06% in Jul of 2011. Three out of the ten MSAs posted positive growth in Jul. In terms of growth performance, five MSAs posted a net improvement from Jun to Jul, three declined in terms of rank. Kankakee dropped to the last place in terms of monthly growth performance, while Rockford climbed up to the first place. Over the last 12-month period, Peoria climbed up to the first place while Champaign-Urbana-Rantoul remained in the last place for the fifth consecutive months.

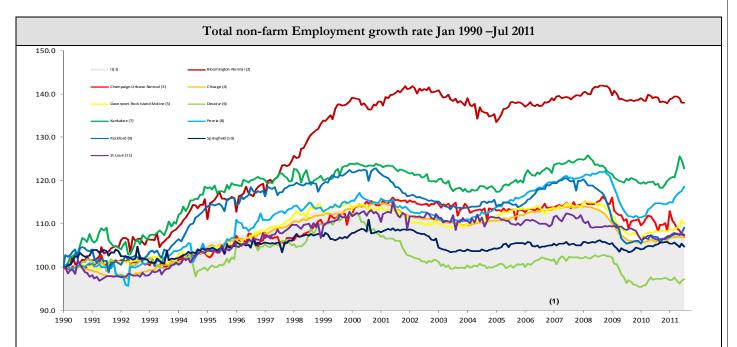
Talking Points							
MSA League Tables	 Davenport-Rock Island-Moline experienced the deepest fall this month (1st to 9th). Springfield (2rd to 6th) and Kankakee (8th to 10th) also dropped in terms of rank from last month. The most remarkable upward move in July was recorded for Bloomington-Normal (9th to 4th). Rockford (4th to 1st), Peoria (5th to 2nd), Chicago (6th to 5th), Champaign-Urbana-Rantoul (10th to 6th) also gained in terms of rank from last month. In the 12 months growth league table, upward moves were recorded for Peoria (2nd to 1st), Rockford (6th to 3rd) and Decatur (8th to 7th) while downward moves were recorded for Kankakee (1st to 2nd), Davenport-Rock Island-Moline (3rd to 4th), Metro-East (4th to 6th) and Springfield (7th to 8th). Chicago and Bloomington-Normal remained in the same place. Champaign-Urbana-Rantoul stayed in the last place for the fifth consecutive month.
